Dear Families,

This letter is to accompany the published version of Castleway Primary School's Ofsted report following our inspection in November 2022. The final report is to be published online this month.

I think you'll agree with me that it is very pleasing to read such positive things about our school and I am happy with the conclusions the inspectors came to after spending two days in our school. The inspectors recognised the many things that we are so proud of here at Castleway and have acknowledged the improvement journey we have been on since my arrival in April 2021. Below are just a few of the wonderfully positive things said about our school.

'Pupils are proud of their school.'	'Everyone is welcome and everyone is valued at Castleway.'	'It is a vibrant and happy place.'
'Pupils understand the importance of treating everyone with equal respect, regardless of their differences.'	'Pupils feel safe and secure.'	'Pupils have positive attitudes to learning and are motivated to try their best.'
'Through their sharp focus and decisive actions to improve the school, leaders have firmly established their high expectations.'	'Castleway is an exciting place to learn and work.'	'Leaders have ensured that pupils, including those with SEND, have access to a broad and ambitious curriculum.'
'Leaders have placed reading front and centre in the improved curriculum.'	'Leaders have ensured that the early reading curriculum is structured clearly.'	'Pupils are polite, friendly and caring towards each other.'
'Pupils benefit from carefully designed opportunities to develop their understanding of the wider world.'	'The celebration of diversity and equality are common threads in all aspects of school life.'	'Members of the governing body have strong expertise and provide appropriate levels of challenge and support to school leaders.'

It's also important to mention something that isn't featured in the report. Janette Walker (the Lead Inspector) commented on the overwhelmingly positive feedback from our families via their online survey: **100% would recommend our school** to others. Janette Walker commented that **this is unprecedented** and we are incredibly proud of this.

It would be an entirely reasonable question to ask why I am pleased when the overall judgement has moved from 'Good' to 'Requires Improvement' since the previous inspection. The answer to that is that our school has been on a significant journey since the previous inspection (March 2016). The inspectors acknowledge this in the report: *'After the previous inspection, there followed a period of considerable instability in school leadership. A new headteacher was appointed in April 2021.'* In addition to this, a new Ofsted framework was implemented that has moved the goalposts considerably, with the intention of making it far harder to gain the top grades. My own thoughts are that this is entirely the right thing to do. Schools need to be challenged and it is quite right that the standards demanded from us are as high as they can be.

I would like to comment on what the inspectors said really stood out for them and that is the ethos and atmosphere within our school. This is nothing that can be manufactured or prepared for when the inspectors call – it is something that takes time to develop and nurture. The preparation for our inspection was minimal, we found out at 9:30am on Monday and the inspectors were in school at 8am the next day. My message to our children and staff was a simple one, do what they usually do because that makes us proud and I am pleased to say they did and we were!


